Montreal Exchange: At half-past four o'clock on Saturday afternoon, April 12, at the residence of the bride's parents, 59 Arlington avenue, Westmount, Montreal, the marriage took place of their only daughter, Naomi Frances, to Mr. V. The ceremony was performed in the bay window of the drawing room, which was decorated with palms and cut flowers, the Rev. George Duncan officiating. Mr. Smith gave his daughter away. She was wearing a lovely gown of ivory satin with irridescent trimming, with train of Georgette crepe and satin and tulle veil, arranged with orange blossoms. She carried a bouquet of calla lilies and white sweet peas.
