

Fort William Nurse Returns From Overseas

Nursing Sister Agnes Olive Armstrong, daughter of the late R. Armstrong and Mrs. Armstrong, 241 south May street, arrived home on Saturday, from overseas. She was a passenger on the steamship "Canada" and left England on March 24th. Miss Armstrong is a graduate of St. Joseph's hospital, Port Arthur, and left for war service in the autumn of 1916, accompanied by Miss Minnie McKay, sister of Dan McKay, and by Miss Komph, of McKellar hospital. Miss McKay, a graduate of St. Joseph's hospital is still in England waiting for transportation.

Miss Armstrong's experience as a war nurse has been a wide one and she fully appreciates the value of that experience as she is an enthusiast in her profession.

Her first military hospital duty was at Lord Derby's hospital in Lancashire where there was accommodation for over five thousand patients and where the equipment was wonderful in its completeness and excellence.

After a year at Lord Derby's hospital she went to another celebrated hospital, Orpington, where she spent a year before going over to France to take duty at St. Omar Normandy. Miss Minnie McKay was with her at St. Omar.

Miss Armstrong had as her special patient at Brighton, Colonel McKeown O. C. at Kitchener hospital, Brighton, and, during her periods of leave, visited many places in Belgium and France as well as in England where she was the guest at many private homes where Orpington nurses were royally entertained.

Miss Armstrong wears as a bracelet her gold identification disc which records her name, religion, rank in profession and the letters "C. A. M. C." She is still under orders at the local armories and, after a day's rest at her home, will report there personally.

A warm welcome home is given her by her old friends who are proud of her record.
