

# AWARDS FOR SALES OF THRIFT STAMPS

## SHIELDS ARE PRESENTED TO WINNING CLASSES IN PUBLIC AND SEPARATE SCHOOLS

The shields awarded by the Schools Thrift Stamp committee to the room in each public and separate school and in the Collegiate Institute which had bought the largest amount of Thrift Stamps per capita in the period between February 17 and June 15, were distributed to the various classes yesterday afternoon. Cranston, chairman of the schools' cam-

paign committee, was unable to take part. The successful rooms in each school are as follows:

Prospect, room 10—Miss Elliott (teacher).

Central, room 7—Mrs. Read.

South Ward, room 2—Miss Grant.

North Ward, room 7—Miss Switzer.

Old High, Current River and Hill schools, room 1 in old High—Miss Spark.

Separate school, room 8 (entrance class).

Collegiate Institute—Form 5.
