### Pte. Charles Joseph McCullough

Rev. Fr. W. F. McCullough, pastor of St. Agnes' church, west Fort William, has received a telegram from the records office, Ottawa, announcing the death of his brother, Charles Joseph McCullough, of the Canadian overseas forces. The death occurred at the Canadian military hospital, Eastbourne, England, on May 10. There was evidently some delay in forwarding news of the casualty. Fr. McCullough had previously received a telegram notifying him that his brother was seriously ill. The deceased was taken ill when he was making preparations for his return to Canada.

The late Mr. McCullough was thirty years of age and was born in Lonsdale, Ontario. He was a young man of considerable promise, and when he enlisted for overseas service was studying for the priesthood. He had been attending college at Buffalo and Boston, but returned to Canada and enlisted with the infantry forces at Kingston, Ontario.

Both his parents predeceased him,

and he is survived by five brothers, who are: Fr. Dan. McCullough, of McCook, Neb.; James McCullough, of Ridgetown, Ont.; Henry McCullough, of Lonsdale, Ont.; John McCullough, of Marmora, Ont., and Fr. W. F. McCullough, of Fort William.

Requiem high mass for the late Charles J. McCullough will be sung in St. Agnes' church Friday morning at nine o'clock.
