PTE. C. A. LITTLE, M. M.

Pte. Little is one of two brothers who served with the C. E. F. He enlisted with the 94th battalion in 1916 at the age of seventeen. After reaching England he was drafted into the 28th battalion and after serving with that unit a short time was transferred to the army service corps because of his youth, as he was not yet of military age.

He served with the army service corps until the time that he left France.

During the heavy fighting at Amiens in August of 1918, Pte. Little was awarded the military medal for conspicuous gallantry. It was a long time afterwards before Pte. Little would explain to his parents or friends the deed for which he was awarded the decoration, but he finally said that it was for carrying supplies to the front line under heavy shell fire, in company with another lad.

At the same time he was slightly shell shocked, but remained on duty.

He wrote recently from England saying that he expected to be home in the very near future, and he may be upon the ocean at the present time.

He is well known among the younger circles in the city, having come here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. Little, 121 Amelia street, west, as a little lad. He attended Francis street school and will be well remembered by ex-students of that institution.

Previous to enlisting he was employed in the west Fort William office of the Canadian government railway.

His brother, J. H. Little, went overseas with the original 28th battalion and lost an arm in action at Passchendaele. He was invalided to Canada, became very ill and spent a year in a sanatorium in Winnipeg, where he died recently. His body was brought to Fort William and accorded a military funeral.
